


## **Observations:**

**Oil spill** response requires a wide variety of ocean state information, the sort of data which GOOS strives to maintain and make publicly available. Recent achievements in making satellite data available in real time have greatly improved the ability of emergency responders to track the spill and coordinate efficient cleanup efforts. In the past, cleanup crews couldn't get satellite images until much later, so by the time they had their hands on the pictures, the conditions they depicted were out of date. 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John Lyman, an oceanographer at <u>NOAA's Joint Institute for Marine and Atmospheric</u> <u>Research</u>, led an international team of scientists that analyzed nine different estimates of heat content in the upper ocean from 1993 to 2008. The **Argo profile data** were used to calibrate the older data and show that the warming signal can be discerned as six times larger than noise estimates. The researchers claim the warming of 0.16 degree C, is 80% of the excess heat captured by greenhouse gas effect in the past 16 years. IOC/GOOS News: Argo data show 16-year Ocean Warming Trend

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In what might become **the greatest melt back of Arctic sea ice to date**, GOOS data has helped to describe and monitor in near real time the extent of Arctic Sea Ice. A combination of warmer than average weather systems and a thinner than average ice sheet from last winter, may result in a record melt back of the Arctic Sea Ice this summer. OOPC is monitoring the Arctic Sea Ice Extent on its <u>State of the Ocean website</u>.

GOOS is a partner to the ENHANS project to improve understanding of

critical phenomena associated with extreme natural events and to analyse impacts of the natural hazards on sustainable development of society; promote studies on prediction of extreme events; disseminate knowledge and data on natural hazards; and establish links and networks with international organizations through a consortium of experts of ICSU Unions and several major intergovernmental and multi-national organizations involved in the project. 
